TESSA HIV-IPV Expansion Program

Partners: JPS Trauma Services, JPS Community Health, UNT Health Science Center

Goal: Increase access to health, support, and HIV prevention services for survivors of intimate partner violence (IPV).

Impact: TESSA is currently being implemented in four JPS clinics. At the end of March 2020, 1,229 individuals (74% women) have been screened for IPV and 223 were connected to services.



Cancer Prevention & Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT)

Partners: JPS Hepatology Clinic, JPS Primary Care Medical Homes, JPS Information Technology, UT Southwestern

Goal: To accelerate adoption of national guidelines for hepatitis C virus (HCV) testing as a means of liver cancer prevention.

Impact: Between March 2019 and March 2020, 27% (5,685) of eligible individuals at JPS were tested, which exceeds national testing proportions.
